Once again we'd like to spotlight a Region II member with a short autobiography,  
And who better to "introduce" than our hard-working Region II chairperson...



### Pat Norton-White



As a child growing up on Long Island I had to satisfy my passion for horses with weekly riding lessons at a nearby riding stable. Suburbia was not conducive to having a horse of my own. My cousin, however, moved from L.I. to upstate N.Y. and proceeded to get a horse. My cousin was gracious and allowed me to ride her horse, Tiny. Tiny was a VERY large, not so pretty, Appaloosa. She had a big head, watcheye, and no mane or tail to speak of. She was everything I had been dreaming of.

Years went by and I rode Tiny every summer and as many weekends as I could. When I left for college I learned my cousin was selling Tiny. I did what every horse-crazed poor college student would do - I bought her. She was 18 and I was 19 and life was complete.

I had also dreamed of raising horses for a living and had enrolled in the Equine Program at SUNY Cobleskill. After a semester, I decided that I loved horses, but was unsure about pursuing a career in the field. Instead I earned a B.S. in Literature, which my Dad always said was an extremely appropriate degree! Eventually I went back to college and received my M.S. in English Education. Teaching has allowed me to combine my love of literature, children, and horses into my life.

Tiny was with me for many years, living to the ripe old age of 32. She had the pleasure of living in the four stall post and beam barn my husband, Ron, had built. By then we had acquired a pony for our oldest daughter, Heather, and several other horses given to me by a childhood friend's father. He was a lawyer and had a client who became unable to care for her horses, so they came to us. Silver Baron, a TB X Appaloosa, and Onyx, a Morgan X TB, became new mounts for my daughters to begin their riding careers. They started in 4-H and moved on to Pony Club.

Pony Club is a wonderful organization, which I believe in 110%. I am presently the Joint DC of Brumbies Pony Club and have served as the Secretary of the Western New York Region of USPC. Our experiences with Pony Club are invaluable.

Pony Club required that my daughters continue to be mounted appropriately, which seemed to present our family with many "learning experiences." Melissa at 9 years old needed a safe and steady mount. I found a palomino QH pony for her. Rose was small and stout and wouldn't do more than she was asked. She seemed a good fit. Several months later, as Rose became stouter; we learned that we had actually purchased two ponies! Rose presented us with not only our first foal, but with our first BEC colt!

Shortly after this experience it became apparent that Baron was getting too old for Heather to continue to ride, so we set off to find a horse for her. The TB gelding we found for her eventually turned out to be dangerous. This exhausting experience made me determined to learn from my mistakes. In 1999 we found Greystone McDickinson, an 11 year old Connemara X TB cross, who is Heather's soul-mate. Dickens, as he is appropriately named, offered his pony personality to me to fall in love with and the rest is history.

I soon began dreaming of a Connemara of my own. I decided it would be wise to start by visiting Connemara breeders. While at Ginny Winkler's I must have had my "SUCKER" sign flashing, because Ginny, who had been serving as a BOG member and Region Chair, roped me into being the Region Chair against my better judgment. I had offered to help with a newsletter, but she thought I should serve as Region Chair. She offered to help me and she made good on her promise. She's been a great mentor and a wonderful friend.

My herd grew as I found a two-year-old filly named Foothill's Freedom. I bought her off of the Internet from Vanessa and Charlie Morgan. Shortly thereafter, with my "disease" progressing, I also acquired a pregnant mare, Cobweb Allison, from Lora Howard. Of course her colt, Catskill Keiran, is still on our farm as a member of the family.

Our little farm has emerged as the focus of our lives. My husband Ron, along with our daughters Melissa and Heather, all take part in working with our ponies. We raise a few well-loved ponies and I continue to stay involved in the ACPS, serving on the Awards Committee and presently acting as Chair of the Internet Committee. Pony Club is still an important part of our lives. We have hosted and participated in many clinics with Missy Ranshausen, Dorothy Maxfield, Richard Lamb, and other top clinicians. The joy we get from helping others learn about horse care and riding is immense.

My favorite place to be is in the barn or riding one of my ponies. It is a great life and I feel blessed to have gotten to know so many other wonderful people who share my passion. Blessed be the ponies.

## Dressage at Devon

On Thursday, September 29th, a group of Connemaras from both Regions II & III assembled in front of the Dixon Oval at the renowned Devon show grounds. The first class of the day was the Mountain & Moorland Ponies judged by Bert Morland, a guest judge who also judged the class last year. The class had a total of 27 entries with entries from the Highland, New Forest, Dales, Connemara, Fell, Welsh Cob, Welsh and Shetland ponies. The quality of the ponies entered this year were a much higher caliber than last year and it was great to see such a strong showing of ponies at one location.

After two hours of gusty wind and sprinkles of rain the class was pinned with Grand Champion pony going to a Fell Pony: Brackenbank Poppy with a score of 87%. Reserve Champion was the Welsh Cob, Tangwylt Dawna Lisa with a score of 84%. Third place was Tudor Blue Bell, a Dale, Fourth was Glenhaven Barossa Valley a Welsh Cob, Fifth was Kynynmont Moira a Connemara, Sixth went to Morning Glory Ilyushin, a Connemara; Seventh was Llancloudy Magic Diamond, a Fell; Eighth was Mirwood Midnight Aurora, a Shetland; Ninth was Ridgetop Windy City, a Connemara; and Tenth place went to Ridgetop Hazy Blue, a Connemara.

The third class of the day was the Connemara class, judged by Jennie Loriston-Clarke who is known for producing Olympic caliber dressage horses. By the time the Connemara class was starting the skies opened up and rain started pouring from the sky. Unfortunately, the "annual Devon rain" didn't stop until the class was over! The ponies all behaved well and cooperated even with the sloppy footing and drenched coats. We even received a comment from the announcer that we were the easiest group of exhibitors to work with during the entire show! The results from the are as follows: First went to Karen McIntyre with Ridgetop Windy City, Second to Marynell Eyles with Ridgetop Hazy Blue, Third to Cynthia Polk Bonnie with Guthrie's Bonnie Gingersnap, Fourth to Pam Liddell with Kynynmont Moira, Fifth to Suzanne Dale with Morning Glory Ilyushin, Sixth to Nicole Haas Perin with Erin Terra's Dream On, Seventh to David O'Flaherty with Guthrie's Bonnie Mojo McDuff and Eighth went to Jim Finn with Barleymalt. Other ponies to compete included: Sean Young with Fieldstream's Celtic Cullen, Marian McEvilly with Patty's Look @ Me, Pam Liddell with Kynynmont Arianna, and Sam Davis with \*Hayselden Perseus.
